As we enter into this special month of February, I reflect once again (can you ever really reflect enough?) on this gift of love. Love is such a hard concept to understand in my opinion. And I think you all would agree with me. We can't help but love some folks more than others. It's just natural. When I say I love my neighbors, I would be lying if I said I loved them as much as I love my wife and kids. And this is where the many different kinds of love come in. I believe we know of romantic love and family love.

These kinds of loves are based on how we feel about people and perhaps how long we have known them and how close we have become with them. We favor them over other people based on these factors. How we are called to love our neighbor, I believe simply, boils down to seeing them as though they have value and worth. To love another is to see their human-ness. Often we de-humanize people by categorizing them into a larger group of people based on one or two traits. We de-humanize people and objectify people which goes even further than stereotyping. We objectify people when we deny them or become insensitive to their basic human needs and rights. The gospel story is amazing in regards of Jesus who saw the humanity in everyone. He dined with "sinners" who had been objectified. He healed the sick who also had been objectified. He forgave people who trespassed against him instead of judging them (again, objectification). And yet, he himself was objectified on the cross. The son of God who showed love to all who was shown so little himself in the end.

To love is to see one another's humanity which is to be empathetic with one another. To stereotype is to come to a judgement on someone else's life. When we judge, it is the same as drawing a line in the sand. I have no problem with drawing those lines that we need to draw. We have to at some point refuse to give another inch. The problem for many of us is that we draw that line way too far away from other people. To draw that line is to say, I have heard enough and I am done, I have made a judgement of who you are and my mind is set. In doing so, we limit and cut short people's lives and stories which are a part of their humanity. The further that line goes back, the less we are willing to compromise. But the truth is, you can't say you love your neighbor without showing some compromise. Of course, remember now, compromise is never a one way street. It's a street that meets in the middle. To love our neighbor is to be willing to go to the middle. For it is there that we will, in love, better understand one another and the humanity that exists within us all.




